Marsie worked with the pupils sharing information about British Sign Language and highlighting the benefits to society of an equal and inclusive community. The pupils learned the BSL fingerspelling alphabet and by the end of the session they were able to sign their names to one another.

The sixth year pupils were very enthusiastic about the afternoon and following this introduction to BSL, many are keen to develop their knowledge by accessing further training.


Cosmetology/Hairdressing Masterclass

Many companies joined us for the event to provide teachers with more in depth knowledge about progression routes and opportunities within their field. As a result 89% of teachers said they felt more confident giving young people career advice.

Accounts & Finance

Some pupils went to Grant Thornton to hear from staff currently undertaking the Accelerated Learning Programme, the Graduate Programme as well as more senior members of staff. It also involved pupils working in teams to undertake a case study about clients of Grant Thornton. They had to find the issues in the case study and feedback. This task is one that is used at their assessment day; therefore anyone who gets to this stage of the interview process, at Grant Thornton or elsewhere, will be well prepared for it.





Future Learn Short Courses

We have 11 pupils from S6 piloting Future Learn Courses. These courses are written by Universities and there is a wide range of courses on offer.

S1 Gaelic

FilmG is MG ALBA's Gaelic short film competition which is delivered by Cànan, the multi-media company based on the Isle of Skye. The competition was launched in 2008 in order to develop new talent for the Gaelic channel BBC ALBA. As part of FilmG 2017 we were recently offered a 2-day film-making workshop with Cailean Collier and Arthur Donald who helped our 1st year Gaelic pupils to script, film and edit their own short film. A number of prizes are on offer in the FilmG Youth category, such as "Best Film", "Best Mobile Short" and "Best Performance". Award nominees are invited to a special awards ceremony hosted by MG Alba, in Glasgow, at the beginning of next year.
